
I pray that in the next few years in the SAMS family we will know the joy and privilege of being people with beautiful feet!!

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# **MEN AT WORK**

**R**aymond Campbell and Dale Crompton from Annaghmore Parish have returned from Paraguay after working in the Chaco region, alongside indigenous church communities. The two skilled men went in partnership with SAMS and Mission Paraguay. On first arriving in Paraguay, Raymond and Dale spent a few days staying at the Anglican Church in Roque Alonso. They were able to participate in children's work carried out by the "Toy Library" ministry. The Toy Library is operated by FEISA, the Anglican teacher training College. Dale had brought along some footballs and pumps to donate and these were received with great delight. The Sunday morning church service was a revelation to Raymond and Dale. It lasted three hours!

Raymond and Dale moved on from the capital city and travelled into the Chaco with Chris Hawksbee, who was to be their guide and work partner. Chris, who grew up in the Paraguayan Chaco, works full time with the Indian churches and communities, helping them draw up their own projects, offering technical support in areas such as selling their honey

and agricultural produce and giving Christian encouragement. Raymond and Dale worked with local men on the church at tasks which included re-plastering inside and outside, building two walls, repairing the roof and replacing wooden beams and brickwork. The two Annaghmore men also found time to help build two houses for local families in an area called "El Estribo", where Chris works regularly.



Aside from work, the Annaghmore men didn't show themselves up with their culinary skills. Raymond's method of tenderising the Sunday cut of meat by bashing it with his trowel was the talk of Rio Verde!

SAMS wants to take this opportunity to thank David Orritt, Mission Paraguay Co-ordinator for making the necessary connections to make this placement work.

In October, John and Phyllis Logan from Coleraine made the now familiar journey to Brazil to visit the Monte Horebe School in Itaperuçu, Paraná state. During their time there they evaluated the ongoing work and shared with and encouraged their Brazilian colleagues. Phyllis talked with the children whose education is being sponsored through the generosity of people in the UK and updated their family histories. John inspected the classrooms and assisted the Principal with matters of school improvement. He also spent time teaching physical education and introduced some

mini rugby skills with the help of sets of kit and balls donated by Coleraine Rugby and Football Club. The children have adapted easily from a round ball at their feet to an oval ball in their hands!

Working in the school is but one strand of the involvement which John and Phyllis continue to have with Itaperuçu. Of particular importance at the moment is the social development of Caçador, an impoverished rural area some 25 miles from the town itself. The wealth which so obviously exists in parts of Brazil and within certain levels of society has permeated

neither to Caçador nor to countless other similar regions.

Apart from a Bible study programme, the work currently being done by the Monte Horebe project within the Caçador community is chiefly in the area of health. This occurs through a volunteer nurse visiting the new community centre weekly as well as a GP and a paediatrician visiting on a monthly basis. Since the nearest local government first aid post is situated some 10 miles from Caçador and is inaccessible in wet weather, the new arrangement has proved of considerable value.

Education is a second major priority and plans are under-way to develop a school in Caçador. When the school is operational, most children will have comparatively easy access to education and will not experience the current discontinuity in their studies. During one particularly wet period this October the school bus was only able to access Caçador on one day out of five due the state of the dirt roads. While still not operating to

its fullest potential, the new community centre is proving to be of considerable importance to the area.

John and Phyllis on behalf of the people of Caçador and of Monte Horebe want to thank all Buena Vista readers who have contributed not only towards the building but also to the general development of the community.

# ARGENTINA

**W**e had the privilege of visiting Argentina in late September and early October. It was a very positive experience with many encouragements as we saw and met people who shared with us about God's work in their lives and in various situations.

We started our time in the North, making a visit to the Chaco with Alec Deane, staying in Mission Chequena, followed by some time in Salta. Alec has a great gift in relating to the Wichi people and the evident trust between them is inspiring. With Alec, we visited a number of the Wichi homes where the Siwok crafts are carved and fashioned into such attractive quality products. Many of the craft workers have gained much support and advice from Alec, who always seems to be creative and full of ideas. Sales of the Siwok crafts provide a livelihood to many Wichi families and it was a joy to meet these genuine fair trade producers. We were also able to visit some of

the gardens certain Wichi families now cultivate as a result of the SAMS Garden Project. Support of these projects is gratefully received by those in Northern Argentina. Your prayers, purchases and donations to support the Garden Project and Siwok Crafts are highly valued. It was a joy to see some of the beauty of Argentina and to learn more of the ministry of Andrew and Maria Leake, Chris and Helena Wallis and Cecilia of the Red Box Project. We were pleased to have been able to join in worshipping the Lord at San Andres Church in Salta, where we

Our time in the North was followed by attendance at the SEAN Hispanic Conference in Buenos Aires. The Conference delegates came from most of the countries of South and Central America where they were running TEE (Theological Education by Extension) programmes using SEAN courses. SEAN (Study by Extension to All Nations) began 41 years ago and has been greatly used by God in discipleship and leadership training. The testimonies and stories shared at the conference of how God has used SEAN were amazing
