In July 2019, Val Thom brought a small team to Rio de Janiero to work alongside Boas Novas church in Niteroi and Christ Church Rio.

"We arrived at Rio Airport with our suitcases full of games and an accordion in each case. Joao (*our translator*) met us and transported us to the apartment in Niteroi. Our team consisted of Nathan, a member of Portadown Defenders Flute band and Honor and Jacqui, members of John Hunter Accordion Band.

We had a fantastic two weeks working in Sonya's House putting up ceilings and painting. The last day was set aside for Joao and I to do preparation work for the next team. Our final evening was fantastic, the church held a thanksgiving service and supper. We had a great evening of fun and fellowship; the team played their accordions and the Brazilians all lined up to have a try. We presented Pastor Carlos with a teddy bear from Dunamoney band but it was promptly taken by his wife!

The next morning tragedy struck; Joao had died in his sleep. As we found Joao, the doorbell went, it was Pastor Carlos. He wasn't supposed to come and see us that day, but God knew he was needed. In the shock and chaos of the moment, God was in control. It was a very difficult end to a fantastic time. Joao's mother told us that the last entry in Joao's diary on the night he died were the words of the song, 'In Christ Alone'. She also thanked us for loving her son. We continue to be in contact with Joao's mother and family who are continuing to come to terms with Joao's untimely death. Please join with us in praying for them."

As we approach a new decade the Council of SAMS Ireland has been keen to celebrate all that God had done over the years and all that God is doing currently, whilst seeking God's guidance concerning how we can further enhance the work of SAMS in a changing cultural and global environment.

With that in mind SAMS Ireland sought guidance from a well known Christian leadership advisor, Tommy Stewart, who has significant experience working with the Church of Ireland, other denominations and other mission societies. Following a period of planning and preparation Tommy facilitated an overnight retreat for the SAMS Ireland Council at the Dromantine Retreat Centre in June 2019, at which Council members had the opportunity to pray together and seek God's guidance for the ministry.

This was reviewed, discussed and agreed at the SAMS Council meeting in September. Our Mission is to encourage the Church in Ireland to support, empower and partner with the Church in South America.

In the coming years, working primarily with the Anglican Church in South America, we aim to: 1. Support the growth of the Church in South America.

- 2. Encourage the Church in Ireland by widening its vision of mission, through partnership with the Church in South America.
- 3. Provide practical opportunities for the Church in Ireland to engage with and serve the Church in South America.
- Play a full part as an Anglican mission society within the Church of Ireland and as a member of the 'Association of Mission Societies'.
- 5. Be excellent in governance, stewardship and communication.

THE WORK CONTINUES

Following on from the agreement of the new strategic direction for SAMS Ireland an operational plan is being developed to enable the SAMS Ireland staff team to effectively implement the vision, mission and aims agreed. We look forward to working with friends and partners, old and new, as we press ahead with playing our part in seeing the great commission fulfilled in South America.

BUNBEG TO CONCEPCIÓN

I spent 2 weeks in August in Paraguay. My travel companion was Noel Boyd from Bunbeg, Co Donegal and we visited SAMS Mission Partner, Claire Holmes in Concepción. I had no idea what to expect. I prayed. I did a bit of homework about where I was going and tried to prepare for the unknown.

My brief was that we would be visiting during "Children's Week", a national celebration of the importance of children, and that I would be part of the team visiting youth clubs and children's groups. And by the way Liz, you may be asked to preach - bring a sermon.

Gulp! Help! I have no Spanish - but I did have experience of working with a translator for the deaf. And I prayed.

After three flights, Noel and I were greeted with smiles and warmth, both by Claire

and the people she worked with and ministered to. The language barrier did not matter, because all things in Christ are equal - we understood each other.

I found a small dedicated community, deeply rooted in worship and prayer, devoted to God and to each other. And isn't this an essential ingredient in our Christ led life - love God, love one another.

There was not much prosperity among the ordinary people, but they had wealth in their community and devotion to those who had no faith and a great desire to see them come to faith. I cannot say it was simply humbling, because I found it invigorating and stimulating; it was so refreshing to live among a community saturated in faith.

I saw poverty - the indigenous people live in a region called The Chaco. Their homes are wooden structures, small and inadequate, with no running water, no flushing toilets or hot showers! Barbecues are a treat for us, eating al fresco a treat; here outdoor cooking is the only way, outdoor living compensates for the inadequacy of their homes.

And yet sympathy was not an emotion I would have felt - there was a wonderful dignity here, a beauty in their love for one another and their dedication to the family. Our job was to help them find the love of God in their very meagre lives, and an unconditional love - a love that did not judge by wealth or processions; love for God and love for one another.

We visited several children's clubs. I could see the love of God beaming onto them and beaming through them. We visited youth groups, and I could see the enquiring mind of disciples of Jesus at work. And together we prayed. What did I bring home with me? I brought a deep sense of experiencing and living in community with Christ at the centre. Every morning, every evening, we prayed; every time we set off on a car journey we prayed (which did concern me at first!)

What did I gain? I honestly feel I gained more from being among the people of Paraguay, than I ever dreamt of - I was immersed in Jesus in a very visible way, day and daily, I felt closer to God than I had ever been before, I felt the spirit restless in all I did. The people of Paraguay opened this to me.

Would I go again? Yes please.

How do I feel on reflection? Enriched, invigorated, engaged.
