God has made all sorts of things possible through the sending of His Son into the world and through His ultimate death and resurrection Indeed the outcome of God opening the door of the possible is that the New Testament writers are able to use all sorts of words that describe what can now happen. Words such as, "overcome", "can", "strong", "mighty", "able", "influence" and "power".

This last word 'power' is a clue to what Luke had in mind when describing how God does 'possible'. Luke uses a greek word which is where we get the word 'dynamite'. Simply, God has the power to do it. God allowed all sorts of possible missional outcomes through the outworking of his power in the New Testament church. Time and time again, when people cried out to the God of the possible in prayer. impossible situations were overturned. This is the same opportunity we have now, as we embark on a new year asking a powerful God to overcome whatever impossibilities we encounter, in our lives, in the Church and in Mission

For us 2021 has been the "water year". We have done 5 hand dug and 10 deep wells with our machine since January. These 15 new installations produce over 90,000 litres of water per hour, not bad!

Water projects are connected directly with food production and this has been the rule here also. The visits from the Wichi teachers that know the culture and language produce

results specially where one tried the year before. The basic rule is that the great invention of drip irrigation always produces results when correctly used!

Our team of teachers have been taken on by the Government. This is a new situation where we're risking not being paid but on the other hand it could mean stable work in the future.

THE GARDEN PROJECT

Alec Deane who leads the Garden Project in Northern Argentina writes:

Early in the year we were able to get support from the Czech Embassy to drill 3 wells. Two of them to be done with the machine (50mts each in Misión La Paz and Dragones) and one with hand tools (28mts in Misión Salim). These three wells were successful although we still have a problem connecting the pumps to the electric grid in La Paz.

We have also been blessed with a very generous donor from the US that has funded 8 perforations this year. Four shallow wells completed by hand and 4 deep wells with the mechanical drill. The 3 perforations done in Misión La Paz produced very good water. Three more drillings occurred in Ignacio and

Santa Maria. Two of them turned out to be slightly salty and one produced good water in San Luis/Arenal. People are very happy that they have this much needed water.

The photo above shows a good aquifer we uncovered in San Luis community. They had an enclosed area with a very good fence but had lost their last harvest due to lack of rain. Our offer of this pump was Heaven sent for them. We will be shortly sending our wichi teacher to set up the drip irrigation network. These last six perforations have put a stress on our mechanical drill and we will be doing an overhaul in Tartagal (nearest big city).

PLEASE PRAY FOR:

- Work has never been so large and so varied. I have taken on 3 extra personnel to help with the load and that decision was a good one! Prayer is needed so that I can manage the bigger team and decisions.
- 2. This government has 2 more years in office and possibly will be around for another 4 years so I hope to have influence in public policy decisions.
- We also have 7 Wichi teachers that are an addition to the team. We need prayer to get them to depend on the government rather than on us.

- 4. We have done 15 perforations this year. This is a good number and we hope to do another 8 at least in the next 8 months God willing.
- 5. We have a plan to buy a bigger drill so that we can get to deeper aquifers where the good water lies. This is a bold move, let's hope it works out and that our donor keeps interested in what we are doing.



NEWS FROM CHILE

SAN PEDRO CHURCH, **CONCEPCION**

We are thankful that despite the pandemic new contacts in Chile have been made possible. One such new contact has been Alex Cordova who is beginning a new phase of church development in San Pedro, Concepcion. Under the supervision of Bishop Enrique Lago, Alex Cordova will be working to build up discipleship in this local church. Their hope is to have a church plant developed over the course of the next 5 years. Please pray for Alex, his wife Karina and daughter Emilia, the church community at San Pedro and for Bishop Enrique.



BISHOP SAMUEL MORRISON. DIOCESE OF VALPARAISO

Valparaiso is a huge Diocese stretching for over one third of the length of Chile. There has been a good level of participation from the 13 congregations scattered up and down the Diocese. 


DIOCESE OF ARAUCANIA

The pandemic has been my biggest challenge. Making things harder, such as keeping in touch with people, and adjusting to restrictions every time they changed. I give thanks to God as He is always there and He teaches me through all of this. My trust in Him has grown so much. Now, I know I don't have to worry about anything, even when things get tough.

What are you most looking forward to when you get back to Chile?

To see my family and friends. I miss them a lot!! I think the first couple of months I will be visiting a lot of my friends and family.

How can we pray for you?

I would be thankful if you can pray for 2 things:

Firstly, that I adjust quickly and easily on my return to Chile. Secondly, I don't know what is coming next, so I'll need God's guidance and His wisdom for the future

Having waited for new ministry opportunities, we have entered into partnership with three different groups as a way to encourage each other in our Christian lives

One evening is planned this Autumn with the Clogher Dicoesan Board of Religious Education, as we welcome Jill Hamilton to deliver an online evening of ideas and resources for teaching the Bible to children. COMMUNICATING CLEARLY IN LISBURN AND ALL THE WAY TO CHILE!

In January 2020 the Select Vestry had taken the decision to upgrade our AV system, however, the raising of funds and the arrival of lockdown during the COVID pandemic put a hold on the installation.

As lockdown eased that September, we set about the physical installation of the new equipment that would enable us to continue our online presence as well as enhancing our inperson services. It was recognised and agreed that as we raised funds for this project it could be an opportunity to help others, looking out to our world as well as resourcing the mission of our parish. Following a conversation with Rev Stephen McElhinney (SAMS Ireland) we partnered with the Anglican Theological College (CEP) Santiago in Chile. This was to enable them to purchase new technology that would enhance how they train individuals for ministry in South America. This will enable them to develop a new media department to provide an online system for theological education and formation. Being able to provide quality recorded and live media for training church leaders and church planters will make a significant impact in a country which is 2653 miles long. The total cost of the project for Derryvolgie Parish is around £14,000.

We had designated our harvest offering towards this project which gained a wonderful support of £3737 before Gift Aid. We obviously needed to raise more funds and that is where the idea of walking during June came from. We set out to walk 2653 miles during June, that is the length of Chile. We did it – in fact we walked more than that. A team of 49 people pledged several miles per day some as young as 5 walking with others as old as (best not to speculate). It was wonderful to see the pictures coming in daily as we walked and prayed for our community and the nation of Chile.

This project will have an impact for generations to come. Thanks to all involved in the walking we have raised over £4700 before Gift Aid.

ZOOM PRAYER TIMES



What do you do to try help build community in the middle of a pandemic? One of the answers SAMS Ireland has utilised is Zoom prayer times. For an hour on the first Monday of the month, different South American church leaders have been welcomed to share something of their church work and to describe issues relevant to their setting. Before praying, we are given some points for specific prayer. Depending on numbers

present, participants join a prayer 'breakout' room to pray for what has been heard. After a time of prayer, there is some time for further conversation and encouragement. Technology has had a wonderful impact on bringing the 'immediacy' of prayer right into our homes - in realtime. As God's people who practise prayer, let's make the most of these technological marvels!

INTO URUGUAY - HEART & SOUL!

Bishop Daniel moved to Uruguay from Argentina 3 years ago. He was appointed with a clear vision to simulate renewed missional thinking and church outreach into local Uruguayan society. Along with his wife Mercedes (CMS GB mission partner). they settled into a very new church context and watched, waited and wondered. It soon became apparent that a new approach was needed. After some time, they both became convinced that a fresh Spirit led initiative to start opening the doors of peoples' hearts was to be one of the main initiatives they were to oversee. What has emerged is the 'Soul Institute'. Uruguayan society has been experiencing high levels of mental health issues which have been exacerbated during the pandemic. Where do people go for help when they are in difficult and dark places emotionally and mentally? It's not easy to connect with such people and tragically sometimes it is too late. The 'Soul institute' is a collective effort on the part of the Anglican Church to present to these people, not just another way of living, but to ultimately show people the Saviour Jesus who is the way to find life again in all its fulness (John 10.10).

Bishop Daniel and Mercedes have been using their background in counselling and mental health work. This latest experience is

manifesting itself in allowing them to compile some creative ways in which the church can engage with people in society at large. One such project is 'Soul Home'. There was an unexpected development in June when a tree branch smashed into the roof of what was then the 'Soul Centre'. They were blessed in that no one was injured, but the incident forced a move into another property. This brought with it a moment of clarity. The planned development of a residential 'Soul centre' which was to be the focus of much of this restorative mental health work, should be considered more widely and in the future provide help in 'homes' up and down the country. This latest development has been another step in discerning God's plans.

SAMS Ireland has been building up a partnership with Bishop Daniel in the past couple of years. We were able to welcome him and some of the team from Uruguay on a recent SAMS Zoom prayer time. A SAMS Ireland project grant was made to the Soul Institute last year. Bishop Daniel continues to reach out to other partners who share this same ministry journey on this particular path of encountering mental health issues with the love of God. DENIS JOHNSTON SPONSORED WALK19 JUNE 2021

There was a great sense of eager anticipation in the car park of Lisnagarvey Hockey club, Hillsborough, Co Down. Denis Johnston (former SAMS Ireland General Secretary) marked the occasion of his 70th birthday with a 14 mile walk between two sports clubs that he had played an active role in over the years, Lisnagarvey Hockey Club and Lurgan Cricket and Rugby Club. Many friends and former colleagues gathered to wish Denis well and offer encouragement for the walk which took him nearly 6 hours to complete. Throughout the day, Denis was encouraged by a band of happy walkers which grew in size as the finishing line approached at Pollock Park in Lurgan.

All proceeds raised via a 'Virgin Money Giving page' were distributed between Macmillan Cancer and the SAMS Ireland Mi Esperanza project in Concepcion, Paraguay. The target of £10,000 was surpassed by a magnificent total of over £18,000! We praise God for the generosity of people as well as their willingness to get



involved. As a direct result of this walk, the Indian shelter at Mi Esperanza Church will benefit from new secure facilities for cooking and sleeping. In commenting afterwards Denis said "I have been humbled and amazed by the response from people and I am delighted that these proceeds will help this project in Paraguay, a country that has a special place in my heart'
