MISSION DIRECTOR WRITES...

It used to be that the 'ABC's' of introducing the English language were typically presented as A for Apple, B for Bat and C for Cat etc. Who can remember the alphabet pictograms from school? This way of alphabet presentation made for a uniform learning experience, not only in your classroom, but for schools and classrooms in an entirely different part of the country.

In much the same way, the Bible truths of Gospel and Mission have been taught in quite uniform ways which have clearly stood the test of time.

HOWEVER

In the past there have been some significant times of transition when the new context of culture has led to profound changes in how the same biblical truths have been delivered to new generations. During these epochal moments, new innovative ways of message delivery have been employed to reach hearts and lives that have changed in how they receive information and then self internalised this good news. The invention of the printing press revolutionised how people would read and how printed matter could be distributed.

New times, call for a fresh interpretation of the word of God, which is not dead, but very much alive!



Jesus said "You have heard it said, 'You shall love your neighbour and hate your enemy.' But I say to you, love your enemies and pray for those who persecute you."

(Matthew 5:43-44)

In these verses from Matthew, we hear a familiar phrase 'You have heard it said'. Jesus makes reference to the general culture of the times. He draws out people's attention to what is going on around them. But he then takes these same truths and reinterprets them in the light of fresh God given meaning.

For a long time, Church has followed the 'ABC's' for mission activity. There has always been a general recognition that the church should be involved in this key area of mission. Often it has fallen to the 'few' who have previously been called to a specific mission activity. Many of these people have in times past ended up in some sort of overseas mission posting. This has been a Godly activity and indeed the Lord has honoured and blessed this sacrificial service.

'But I say to you...' These few words have a powerful ability to hold my attention. What new interpretation might our Lord be giving us as to how mission and mission activity is 'reinterpreted' for these new times we live in? No one can deny that this age of the internet has had a profound impact on how people think and take notice of things. It is our privilege and responsibility to take these precious gospel truths and seek the Lord's guidance and wisdom as to how we reinterpret it for today's society.

Fresh thinking and re-interpretation might be easy for the 'early adopters', however the majority of the conservative church is

slower to overcome some initial skeptical reservations on new ways of thinking.

This new year, can I encourage us to dwell on these words 'But I say to you...' What new ways of mission as a lifestyle is Jesus calling us to consider? What fresh thinking will led to new action for mission in your context? Ask God for his new and innovative interpretation for these times!

MISSION DIRECTOR TRAVELS IN URUGUAY & ARGENTINA

After three and a half years it was a great blessing to finally be on South American soil again! One of the joys of church partnership is being able to visit and bring encouragement to different parts of the church in this vast continent. But that encouragement is a two way street, since the true extent of gospel work in many corners of Latin America is noticed and in turn communicated to the rest of Christ's Body - the Church. We praise God that he is at work in the world bringing news of great hope, joy and forgiveness.

URUGUAY

A new chapter of mission work began in Uruguay with the arrival of Bishop Daniel and his wife Mechi approximately 4 years ago. After moving from St Mark's Church in Hurlingham, Buenos Aires, Daniel was ordained bishop with a special task of initiating a new mission

work in the church in neighbouring Uruguay. This has taken the form of two phases. Phase one was a re-ordering of the social outreach project that happens in 9 different locations around the country. Time has shown that this programme while helping the church engage with society, has not caused the church to grow in any significant way. This has led into phase two, which is the formation of a new method of engagement within this secular society. For over two years now, Bishop Daniel and Mechi have been actively developing a community plant in their home. The aim is to bring a fresh community engagement with local people. Daniel and Mechi are using their background in psychology and counselling as a way to interact with people who are suffering from the effects of covid and poor mental health due as a side effect of isolation. With time, the hope and prayer is that this 'community plant' will be a church plant within the anglican church community in Uruguay.

NORTH ARGENTINA

Salta is the main commercial and economic hub of the north. It's here that you will find one of the main Anglican churches, San Andres. The lead pastor, Daniel Lescano has recently been appointed Vicar General for the Diocese. The diocese is extensive geographically, large distances have to be covered in order to visit the many smaller anglican communities of the Indigenous Church network. The appointment of Pastor Daniel as the new Vicar General, is in response to the future retirement of Diocesan Bishop Nick Drayson due in May 2023. After many years of faithful service to the wichi church community in the Chaco through such things as Bible translation and more recently as diocesan bishop, Nick and his wife Katherine (both CMS partners) will be retiring. It was timely that a special congress for the Anglican indigenous church network of South America had been organised from the 6-10 Oct at the La Caldera Centre in Salta. Representatives of the church from Chile, Paraguay, Peru, Bolivia and North Argentina were present. A set of post conference 'Declarations' confirmed the desire to grow and advance as an indigenous church network. When Bishop Nick and Katherine step down next year, this will represent a further stage of the departure of the traditional overseas missionary. The absence of the overseas component in mission will no doubt bring some uncertainty in the short term, but will allow for the local church 'seed' to find its feet and grow with the enabling of God's grace, mercy and protection.

SIWOK - GARDEN AND WELL PROJECT.

In the far north of Argentina, right across the river Pilcomayo from the Paraguay border is Mission La Paz. It's here that Alex Deane (SIWOK) has been active in the past year working with different Wichi communities in the provision of several fresh water wells and drip irrigation for garden vegetables. A generous donation from the USA has enabled a new 'super garden' to be planted. This new large greenhouse has provided an abundance of vegetables - principally tomatoes and green peppers. The health benefits for the project families have been enormous. Clean water and nutritious food have helped many overcome the constant threat of malnourishment and disease. Despite their promises, the local government authorities have been slow to adapt the methods that SIWOK have developed over time. The training of local Wichi garden teachers have allowed for a much greater success rate in the acquisition of new horticultural skills and know how.

MI ESPERANZA - MY HOPE!

Saul and Norma Rodriguez tell us about the ministry of the indigenous shelter at Mi Esperanza, Concepcion Paraguay.

The shelter is a safe place to stay for indigenous people who travel to Concepcion and they can usually stay for up to five days, or longer if there is the need. The church has been providing this service for many years and we have been living on site since the shelter was moved here in 2007. It is a great help for the indigenous people, especially as there is nowhere else for them to stay when they make the often very long journey to Concepcion, for such things as medical treatment, documentation, childbirth, shopping, or to collect their pension.

This year, thanks to a donation received from SAMS we have been able to renovate and extend the shelter. The improvements include the repainting of the original shelter and the construction of an outdoor partially covered area (for shade) a cooking area and two new bathrooms, one for women and children and another one for men. We are also in the process of making the area more secure as on several occasions people have come over the wall to steal. Please pray for security.

We were delighted to receive a donation of 10 beds with sheets which are a great help and especially appreciated by the pregnant women and people who have had accidents.

Recently we were able to help a patient who was injured in a motorbike accident in which his wife died. He stayed in the shelter and we were able to give him spiritual and emotional support

as well as practical help as he went for regular treatment. He is awaiting more surgery. Some of the other people who stay regularly are patients who are receiving dialysis and others with TB.

We and all those who use the shelter are happy with the improvements that have been made and are grateful for the donations and also for your support, love and prayers for us and for them. It is a great pleasure for us to be able to serve in practical ways and to point them towards Christ so that they can develop their faith in Him.

- For those who are sick, that the Lord will help them and guide them towards Himself.
- For God's continued provision for the shelter, that it will be able to carry on functioning because it means a lot to those who come from far away in the Chaco to have a safe place to stay.
- That the Word of God will be taught and that God will help us as we carry out this ministry.

John and Phylis Logan have been in Mount Hoerbe, Itaperucu many times over the years. Here they bring news from the Director, Duda.

Dear Supporters in Ireland,

My name is Duda. I have been Director of Monte Horebe School for 7 years and have been working in Monte Horebe for 26 years.

We praise God for your help, care and love. I write these lines with much gratitude to tell you what God has done for us. Today we have 385 pupils although after the worst of Covid we had problems regarding the non-return of pupils to school. Our classrooms were almost empty as parents were unwilling to send their children into a school environment or because they were experiencing financial problems. However God restored pupils to our classrooms and now we have a good number.

Our pupils have returned after a period of home education during which they found learning difficult, many suffering from anxiety and other syndromes caused by the pandemic. We have plans to augment lessons.

One other important piece of information is that currently we have 27 children with learning difficulties. This includes 11 with autism, some mild, some severe. Overall, however, God has been generous and has given us the capacity to care for these children with much love.

Last year 6 of our pupils gained entrance to university having achieved good grades in Vestibular. This year we have pupils in first place in the "Science and Chemistry Olympics."

You have blessed our children in an incredible way giving them hope for a better life. Your investment has provided them with conditions to help make them God fearing, rounded

citizens capable of doing good works locally and elsewhere.

NELSON OJEDA, AUXILIARY BISHOP IN THE DIOCESE OF SANTIAGO, CHILE

Nelson Ojeda is an auxiliary bishop in the diocese of Santiago, Chile and Pastor of the church 'St Luke the Evangelist'. He and his wife Marisol were part of the delegation of visiting Bishops to attend 'Kingdom Voices' in August last year.

Bishop Nelson writes:

The church which I Pastor has three main areas which we develop.

- 1: Evangelism. We have social projects but make the most of these opportunities to preach the Gospel. We also have activities to intentionally proclaim the gospel e.g marriage meetings and Christianity courses. These are weekend activities and non-christian couples are invited to experience it.
- 2: Discipleship: We teach Scripture to those newly converted to Christ, teaching the basics of the Gospel and then continuing with more advanced studies.
- 3: Practical Help: We support and help those in need. This is important as it leads us to live out the gospel in a practical and concrete way. This has led us to reach out to immigrants especially with people from Haiti, Venezuela and Colombia. In addition to this, our church serves in a hospital in the neonatal section.

I visited Europe for the Lambeth conference and also received an invitation from SAMS Ireland to visit them and share with them in our common mission. I, along with my wife Maria Sol, gladly accepted the invitation. This gave us the opportunity to visit lifelong friends who had been missionaries in Chile.

We visited the Parish of Mossley, a beautiful community where Rev Peter Jones is Rector and I had the opportunity to share the word of God. Even though it was holiday time and part of the congregation were on holiday, I could see the great potential that exists in the preaching of the gospel and the service the church does in the community. We were also grateful to visit the parish of Mullabrack a rural community where Rev. Peter Munce is Rector. The parish has 3 churches that Peter is in charge of and this reminded me of my own pastoral experience when I looked after more than one church. Even today, as well as my Episcopal duties I am responsible for churches in two different areas of Santiago - 'San Lucas Evangelista' and 'El Salvador' church. From January 2023 I will also be rector of CEP, the theological college that trains future pastors.

MEET THE COUNCIL MEMBERS SERIES CONT'D GETTING TO KNOW ALISON HUTCHINSON

My name is Alison Hutchinson, married to Michael, I grew up outside Lisnaskea, Co.Fermanagh, now living in Belfast and am a teacher of French and Spanish in Bloomfield Collegiate.

My parents were lifelong supporters of SAMS and taught me about the importance of mission and supporting it prayerfully and financially. It was part of their lives, and I am grateful for their example. I remember pouring over the SAMS magazines, learning about the mission partners and projects overseas and there began a stirring in my heart about mission and in the Spanish-speaking world in particular. After school I went to QUB to initially study French. During Freshers weekend in the Church of Ireland Centre, Belfast, I met Marianne Maréchaux (nee Whitehead) who was to become one of my closest friends and through her parents, Gordon and Beryl Whitehead, I would learn more of the work of SAMS in South America and start attending the conferences. At Queen's I took up Spanish in my first year and loved it so much that I changed my degree to joint French and Spanish. For many years I attended the Church of the Resurrection, part of the student centre at Queen's and there I met Helen Groves (nee Williamson) who was leading a Beyond The Norm team to Paraguay in 2001. Given that I was now studying Spanish and my interest in the work of SAMS, I jumped at the opportunity to go on what became a life-changing trip. This trip took us from Asunción to Concepción, then to the Chaco and we also took part in a Youth Camp in the countryside. I was inspired by the pioneering work of Claire Holmes, and the team in Concepción under Bishop Andrés Rodríguez



and I felt very strongly that God was speaking to me about serving Him overseas. After leading a team myself to Concepción the following year, I then moved out to serve as a volunteer from 2003-2006. After this time, I continued serving on teams to Paraguay and Argentina through partnership between SAMS and Love for Life and I also travelled several times to Peru, once with St John's Parish, Fivemiletown.

It has been such a joy and privilege to serve the Lord overseas with SAMS and now, based at home I have been delighted to continue to serve Him now on SAMS council. I am thankful that God has given me this opportunity, allowing me to keep up my involvement with SAMS, my connection with the church and partners in South America and to be able to use my skills on the Engage and Partnership team. Thank you also to Stephen and the other council members for their welcome and their patience as I learn the ropes!

Alison joined SAMS Ireland General Council in 2020 and has been a valued member of our board since then.

CLAIRE HOLMES - MISSION DEVELOPMENT OFFICER SAMS IRELAND



A few years ago I was sitting in an airport in South America with a few other mission partners as we made our way back, to spend some months in the UK. It was getting close to boarding time. We were at the indicated terminal and gate, the sign at the gate had our flight number and destination, yet, as boarding time got closer and there was hardly anyone around we realised there was something wrong.

We spotted some of our airline staff and asked them about our flight. Their words were music to our ears - 'Don't worry, we're the pilots and the plane isn't going anywhere without us. Just follow us.' (They admitted they were looking for the plane too.)

We followed with security and confidence because they were the pilots.

We often hear about the changing face of mission and there are so many wonderful changes and additions. Short term mission trips, national leaders raised up in areas where missionaries went with the gospel, people from other parts of the world coming to this country to serve God, Zoom prayer meetings where people from different countries gather for prayer. (Zoom was nearly unheard of 3 years ago!) We thank God for what He is doing. We also ask the question:

Does God still call people to go from here to serve Him in other parts of the world short term, medium term and long term?

Is the command of Jesus to 'GO INTO ALL THE WORLD AND PREACH THE GOSPEL' still as relevant today, as it was over 2000 years ago? We believe the answer is yes and when we ask this question to leaders in South America the answer is 'yes, we want people

to come and serve alongside us.' We are all called to be part of God's worldwide mission in many different ways, and God still calls some people to follow him by going further afield to other nations.

Thirty years have passed, but I can still remember so clearly when I first started to hear the call of God to go to South America. When He put in my mind and heart the thought and belief that He wanted to lead me there. I remember a photo of a child in South America, a story about their life and three questions - will you pray, will you give, will you go? What stayed with me was the INVITATION TO GO and this was the start of a South American journey that is still ongoing.

When God calls, He equips, provides, protects, is with us and goes ahead of us so we can follow with security and confidence as He is the pilot of our lives.

Thank you for the difference you make to the people and the church in South America through your prayers, your generosity, your support and your presence. Please keep praying that the Lord will send out workers and if today you think you might be hearing His voice asking you to go we would love to hear from you.

Summer was absolutely life-changing; not only did my mom come visiting but I was able to experience supernatural healing. During New Wine, God miraculously grew my right leg, aligning it with my left one. My jaw was also healed and I can now talk and eat without my jaw hurting which I couldn't do before. Apart from that, I'd say that even better, I am currently the closest I've ever been with God and that is something that I pray for everyone.

I don't think I would be in the same place if it wasn't for this Fusion placement, so again, I'm forever grateful with SAMS for enabling this amazing opportunity. As life goes on, I'm

thinking of my future and what to do next with it. Many doors are opening and many are closing, I would appreciate prayers on this same topic. Michael Browne (North Argentina)

The Chaco Church Trust seeks to help the developing church in the Chaco region of North Argentina. For many years Michael Browne (CMS associate partner) has been translating the local indigenous languages.

Michael writes about his recent work on the 'Toba' translation:

'With regards to the translation work, our monthly team meeting for November was postponed, mainly due to me not being able to travel yet, because of helping Silvia (Michael's wife) with her convalescence, so now we're planning for the end of the month and the first week of December. Please pray we'll all be able to travel down to Córdoba and that we'll make good progress with the ongoing checking of Exodus, Psalms and Lamentations. We're hoping a special edition of the 12 Minor Prophets will be published soon, so that the Toba translators can take copies back home with them in December, to be distributed within their communities. These "tasters" of the Bible translation work are an important part of what we're doing: a chance for people to read and meditate on passages they've never seen before in their own language, and maybe spot something that needs improving, before the Bible itself is published. It's also a good public relations exercise, letting people know that we're still hard at work and moving forward towards the finishing post!'
