Interview with Maximiliano Díaz (University Minister Santiago de Centro Chile)

Dear Friends of SAMS Ireland,

It is a great pleasure for us to be in partnership with you in university mission. During the present year we have had a lot of mission activities.

First, we prepared, with 6 other Christian university groups, a complete mission week in Santiago de Chile University (USACH), namely "IMPULSO" (IMPULSE). It was a great opportunity to preach the Gospel to non-christian students. Our message was that the Gospel of Christ is the only way to a real meaningful life. In this context, we organised Art presentations, fed almost three hundred students with hotdogs, had live music, preached expositional sermons, had forums, debates, and public conversations. We finished the week with great joy, and with almost sixty phone numbers and contacts to follow up. Secondly, we started the third generation of SEMILLERO (SEEDBED), a training program directed to Secondary and University students. We had 80 participants, from different parts of Chile. They will be with us for two years, learning how to teach the Bible in their context and really thinking about how to apply it.

Thirdly, in our university ministry in Santiago Apóstol Church, we are gathering every Friday as "RCU Nuclear" in the university neighbourhood. We have the leadership training study on how to teach and understand the Bible. Every Tuesday, at lunchtime, we meet in Chile University with non-christian students to have a deep conversation and create a friendship.



Fourthly, please pray for us, as a family, so that we can have a humble 20 re vendo Rita Que tenan Ma

and hospitable heart during the mission. Pray too for our university group in Santiago Apóstol Church, so that we can grow in faith, in obedience to the Word of God, in creativity in the proclamation of the Gospel, in bravery and love in mission.

Please pray too for our second "IMPULSO" mission next August, and for the third generation of "SEMILLERO". Pray that we can lead well and effectively.



humble explorers

Eugene Peterson writes in The Jesus Way,"There are no experts in the company of Jesus, only humble explorers". As we have explored the possibility of serving in Peru it has been and continues to be a regular journey of returning to the place of simply following Jesus one step at a time.

We met while studying medicine and languages respectively at Queen's University, Belfast, with a shared love of mission and Latin America playing a significant role in our relationship. Having both served separately in Peru, Nicaragua and Cuba on short-term teams and placements, our desire was to serve in Latin America together as a married couple.



Meanwhile the Diocese of Peru has been seeking growth in faith, both in depth and width, with a specific focus over the last year on researching discipleship in Peruvian churches. The findings have opened the door for diocesan staff to develop and share a holistic approach to making disciples. Alongside this there are two Compassion projects connected to the Anglican church in Lima which provide education, nutritional meals and assistance to some of the poorest children in the area. It was this unique combination of mission and discipleship alongside education and compassion that stirred our hearts and prompted us to take a step of faith.

PRAYER POINTS INCLUDE:

- Chris learning Spanish through study and conversation.
- That relationships would flourish and that we would feel part of the team of gospel workers there.
- That we can settle quickly into a rhythm of life, prioritising devotion to Jesus first and then investment in the different ministry initiatives that we get involved in.
- For the Anglican church there, that God would move in this time of transition, that we would see people come to faith and be discipled in the local church.
- We hope that our passions and gifts will be of use to the Diocesan team, but ultimately our desire is to serve where we are needed. As we "humbly explore" this next step in Peru, we are excited and expectant for what God has in store.

We have recently completed the 2016 annual accounts of SAMS, which has highlighted the importance of voluntary income to the Society. We are grateful to all who give to SAMS, monthly or less frequently, directly or indirectly, perhaps as a member of a SAMS supporting parish, or as a decision maker for a Trust, Partnership, Company or other organisation able to support the work of Christian charities. Over 95% of the income SAMS received during 2016 was voluntary income, including tax repaid to the Society as a result of donations made to SAMS by people who have signed a valid Gift Aid declaration (GAD). Signing a GAD should be considered by people who pay income or capital gains tax as it increases the value of a donation to SAMS by 25%. A GAD form is available from the SAMS website

www.samsukireland.com or from the SAMS office. Thankfully in this General Election year in the UK, there does not seem to be a manifesto that includes the demise of Gift Aid or the Gift Aid Small Donations Scheme (GASDS), which indicates a recognition of the value of work carried out by charities going forward.

We take this opportunity to also thank those who remember both the financial needs, and the stewardship of resources entrusted to SAMS, in their prayers, as the Society seeks to work out and live out God's mission for the benefit of all, and particularly for those in South America, Iberia, Great Britain and Ireland. Please continue to support SAMS by your prayers and donations.

Is Short-term mission a luxury holiday?

Here are some thoughts from a member of a Mission Paraguay team. She spent 3 weeks in Paraguay.

Did you enjoy your holiday, they will ask. What holiday? I'll say.

Building your own beds; Sleeping in a dorm; Getting up early; Going to bed early; Cold showers, cold feet; Ant infested bed, broken locks, broken keys; Cockroaches, frogs in the sink; Lost luggage, forgotten sleeping bag; Devastation as only seen in movies; Feeling exhausted. Some Holiday!!

BUT this will be my response:

Making new friends; Meeting old friends; Great food prepared with loving hands; Worshiping in new ways; Going to your limits; Receiving more than you can ever give; Teaching for a better life to learn to be a better you; Losing your comfort zone to find a stronger faith; Touching people to be touched by them; A roller coaster of emotions to count your true blessings; This wasn't a holiday. This was a Mission Paraguay experience - the journey of a lifetime.



Zuny, how did you come to faith in the Lord Jesus?

It began in September 1995, when my friend Norma and I belonged to the 'Red Cross' and were helping with first aid at an agricultural show. Whilst there we made friends with some people who invited us to their church. Some months later, we were working in a shop and a work colleague invited us to that same church and we went with her. She introduced us to Bishop Andres, pastor of the church, and his wife Estela. They talked to us about Jesus, and it was then that I put my faith in Him, and asked Him into my life. Even when the battles were really strong and I wanted to give up, the Lord has always been with me, has lifted me up, and my spiritual family have helped me to keep going.

In February 2017 you were in Ecuador. Tell us why you were there?

Recently with Claire and Bryan Thompson I was trained in 'Simply the Story (STS)', an oral method of learning and sharing the Bible with others. For the first time L was able to learn and remember the Bible Stories in more depth, and to discover more about God's plans for my life. I always had the desire to help others learn more about God and know Him more and STS has given me a tool and an opportunity to do this, in Paraguay and now also in Ecuador. At the time of the earthquake in Ecuador in 2016 our church raised some money to send out to help those who had been affected by it. God put in my heart the desire to go to Ecuador and I couldn't believe it when the door opened up to help deliver an STS workshop.

What are some of your most important memories from that time?

Apart from eating worms for the first time?! The area was amazing, but the most important memory is the testimony of the people there, especially those from the Amazon area where we did the course and the testimony and example of Hannah, the missionary who hosted the workshop. We (Lorena who also went from Concepcion and myself) really felt as if we were amongst family. Although I missed my children, it was encouraging to see the work they do with children, and to use my experience working with children, to help train the children who attended the workshop. It was great to see their enthusiasm and desire to know lesus better and to learn more about him

As we pray for the church in Concepcion please share with us some topics for prayer.

Thank you for your prayers. Please pray for strength for us, that we will trust in the Lord, stand firm, and be constant. Pray we will be able to serve the Lord more and more, fearlessly tell others about him and equip them to faithfully serve the Lord.
