THE HAWKSBEE'S

Chris and Alison serve in Paraguay, the country where Chris was born and grew up. Chris, who is trained in agriculture and development, works with the Indian churches and communities in the Chaco region. Alison works at the Asunción Christian Academy as Academic Director. Chris provides technical advice and training in subsistence level farming and cash cropping so that the indigenous Christian communities can support themselves and continue to live sustainably in these remote areas. He works with several of the 17 ethnic groups in Paraguay.

Now living in Asunción, Chris travels frequently to the Chaco. He negotiates with the Paraguayan government and NGOs (Non Governmental Organisations) to highlight the needs of the indigenous communities in the Chaco. He assists pastors of the Anglican church, encourages groups in Christian discipleship, and advises on agricultural, sustainability and development issues.

Chris visits 6 communities or settlements in the Rio Verde area:

- Makthlawaiya
- La Herencia (ex-Sombrero Pirí
- El Estribo
- La Patria
- Saria
- Espinillo

Interview with Cristóbal & Max

Cristóbal Cerón is an Anglican
Pastor in Santiago, capital of
Chile. He and his student worker
Max Díaz tell us where their
church is and share some of their
encouragements at this time.

Hello. Our church is located in downtown Santiago, the central district which is the main political and influential suburb in Chile. On the 1st of May this year, we celebrated our fourth birthday! It has been an enormous encouragement to

see non- Christians converted and mature Christians getting passionately involved in mission.

Max, how have the first few months gone for you in this new ministry? What are some of the things you do each week?

It has been three months of getting to know the students. Much of the week I spend walking in campuses and talking to people. In downtown Santiago alone there are almost 150 thousand students. It has been very hard at times but God has

given us grace to persevere.

My other main activity is to connect with different faculties and offer them courses that may help students in areas that will not be taught in University. I also run a department that aims to deepen passion for missions and train future gospel workers. It is called "Challenge" which is part of the Anglican Church.

What are your plans for the future in the student outreach and in the church?

The aim is to establish a student ministry that will help people know Christ. It will begin small, probably establishing a weekly bible study (first 6 months) and then grow to hopefully create a ministry that could become a church plant. In the meantime, we are trying to generate opportunities for service, mercy ministries are very encouraging at this time.

What can we in Ireland and the UK pray for?

Please pray for perseverance and boldness as we preach

the gospel to a post-Christian generation. Pray that we in ISA (Iglesia Santiago Apóstol) may be able to be like big brothers to the students we are reaching, so that a significant Christian movement may be born in Chile for the glory of God. Pray that we may be able to hear God's voice as we take strategic decisions for the future of the ministry, because we don't want to spend time nor resources in "our" plans but in His plans.

To all in SAMS ... Thank you for being willing to be part of the gospel work here in Chile!!!

It also facilitates a gap year programme which provides placement opportunities for young adults from the UK and Ireland to participate within a church and community setting in South America. Cecilia Valdiviezo from Argentina, the Red Box Co-

ordinator, believes passionately that God calls and sends us into our communities to participate in His mission, going beyond our comfort zones by embracing evangelism and social action.


Peter Harrison, the 16th SAMS volunteer has concluded his year participating with the Red Box Project. Whilst spending six days in Bermejo in Bolivia, Peter reflected - "There were so many things God had been doing with me prior to my week in Bermejo, so having to leave Argentina to renew my visa created the opportunity to rest in Him and His presence while spending time with Bolivian Christians.

Pastor Marcelo collected me up from the Bolivian side of the river and we headed to his house for a pretty snazzy lunch! My programme was very busy for the six days I stayed, it contained various activities such as home visits, preaching, speaking in a University and sharing through sport. One of my favourite experiences was meeting a man called Ruben, who has an exceptional testimony of God's grace in his life. A former lawyer and alcoholic, he now speaks to students in schools and universities through a programme which emphasises the importance and necessity of having Jesus in your life. He and I both shared our lives with a few of the students informally sitting at a table at the University, God moved and all six gave their lives to Jesus. It was an

honour to meet this man because his example, character and integrity was inspirational. God gave me the opportunity to speak about His goodness to members of the congregation in the church in Bermejo. It had been heavily on my heart to preach and not only did I have one opportunity, I had four! I was really pleased to share from the Bible and to be attentive to God's voice as he spoke through me. However, I believe that the best thing about Bolivia, apart from the immense family atmosphere, the preaching and meeting so many inspirational and impressive people, was just being able to be in a quiet place with God, offering sacrifices of praise to Him. I have learnt about the power of declaration. I kept declaring who I am in Jesus and what He has accomplished through dying on the cross for me, and in doing so I recognise my freedom which gives me courage in going through spiritual battles and also being at peace.

A VOYAGE OF DISCOVERY

In the summer of 2003 I departed for Salta, Northern Argentina, as part of a SAMS 'Beyond the Norm' team from the Diocese of Derry and Raphoe, led by Bishop Ken and Mary Good. I had just finished teacher training and had been appointed to a post in Clondermot High School (now Lisneal College) in Londonderry. This was a formative time in my professional life but it was to be equally, if not more, significant in my spiritual journey.

I became a Christian when I was thirteen years old and had always been actively involved in parish life – serving on the Select Vestry, teaching at Sunday School, and leading our Youth Fellowship. But I also felt that God wanted me to

journey deeper in my relationship with Him, and that He was calling me to new avenues of Christian service. As I embarked for Salta this was very much in my mind and I hoped that three weeks in South America, and the opportunities that this trip would present, would help me discern what God was saying to me.

As I reflect back on those weeks in Salta I can honestly conclude that they were a real voyage of discovery. When I left Northern Ireland, I somewhat arrogantly, thought that I was aging to South America to transform the lives of the people there. Three weeks later I was the one who had been transformed! I was encouraged by the depth of the faith of the people I met, their dedication and commitment to God, and their willingness to put their faith into action. They were prepared to travel well beyond their comfort zones, to go the extra mile, in seeking to communicate the Gospel by word and deed. This challenged me to assess my own journey of faith and how God was calling me.

One way in which this trip helped me discern the will of God was that it offered a wide range of experiences: for example, children's clubs, praying with people who were waiting to see a doctor in a local church hall, and building projects. I also preached in a church for the first time in Salta!

After three weeks in South
America I returned to Northern
Ireland encouraged and more
clearly focused on pursuing the
call of God. The full exploration
and pursuit of this call would
take a further ten years, and
would ultimately lead to my
ordination in September 2013.
But I look back with fondness,
and thankfulness, on the summer
of 2003 and regard my time
in Salta to be the beginning of
a remarkable journey which I
consistently thank God for.

As many of you know the local church here is in a time of change due to the retirement of Bishop Andres back in May. In the short term the church won't have a pastor. The idea is that the church council will be responsible for the ministry of the church. Leadership and learning are indispensable to each other, so pray for unity, a sense of togetherness and in this transitional time pray that we experience growth within the local congregation. Javier is going to be the Vice President of the council for this year so please pray for him and his wife Myriam.

Please pray too for Norma and Saul who are responsible for the Indian shelter. They do a great job, and their ministry is so important as it enables the Indians to spend a few days in a safe and supportive environment while passing through from the Chaco. The Indian shelter is located in a neighbourhood called 'Inmaculada', its an area with many challenges. It's renowned for drug dealing, but give thanks for a steady group of children and young people who we are working with. Pray for the children and young people and the families they come from.

This summer two groups of volunteers from churches in the UK and Ireland will visit Paraguay to work with the Anglican church in different areas of the country. Several members of Annaghmore Parish will be working with mission partner Chris Hawksbee on a variety of building projects in La Patria in the Chaco, while others from Portstewart and Lisburn will be visiting Asunción and Concepción where they will work alongside Claire Holmes.

The bullet points below highlight some of the areas were specific resources will be directed in the coming weeks and months.

This includes:

- Building brick walls for a school in the Chaco.
- Constructing a 21,000 litre underground rainwater storage tank.

- Making toilet cabins for Indian families with no facilities.
- Working alongside Chris
 Hawksbee to provide new homes
 and improvements to existing
 homes for Indian families.
- Funding the mobile toy library which enables children with no toys to learn through play.
- Completing the building at Ramonita which is used for children's ministry.
- Continuing to support the sewing workshops which encourage women in poorer communities to become more self sufficient.
- Supplying and distributing spectacles to people who cannot afford to visit an optician, over 1,000 pairs have been supplied in 2014.
