

Esperanza




Esperanza which, by the way, means 'Hope' is a foster home in Asuncion, Paraguay. The project which is a home began in 2005 and it works within the national adoption system, caring for young abandoned children as it seeks families to adopt them. The staff are all local women.

Recent months have been filled with both joy and sorrow for the Esperanza Foster Home. In September, Alexis was finally able to go to his adoptive family who are Christians. On October 17th, Esperanza's 5th anniversary was celebrated with treats and a trip out for the five children. The following week brought great

excitement as young Jose Antonio was granted a place to have further surgery on his cleft palate, courtesy of the "SMILE" charity, despite there being only 125 children offered surgery out of the 300 requesting it.

Sadly he has since had a bad case of herpes in his mouth and has had to give up this opportunity. Amongst all this, Juana (foster mum) has had the worry of her 20-year-old son suffering an acute appendicitis. Please pray for God's hand over these situations and for the new child that the Adoption Centre will be choosing to take Alexis' place in Esperanza. Thank you!

term study placement with SAMS in Northern Argentina.


During my first week in Salta I felt really alone and as I speak no Spanish, it didn't help matters! Thankfully, once I started getting involved in the community projects and meeting people, my whole experience of Salta changed! Every day brought new experiences and I was constantly being challenged and pushed beyond what I thought I was capable of. I am so grateful to have got to meet local people through working in a soup kitchen and at the local hospital. I learnt lots from spending time at the soup kitchen, meeting the drug addicts and hearing about their lives. From my first time there I could feel God's Spirit at work and I continue

to pray for the transformation of the lives of the people there. The majority of the people I met were open to receiving prayer. From these projects, God has opened my eyes and I am now challenged to consider why I don't visit my own local hospital or cook lunch for drug addicts here at home where I actually speak the language!!

I also had the opportunity to observe Cecilia's (Red Box Coordinator with SAMS) work during my time in Northern Argentina, which although I didn't understand a word of what was going on, I learnt a lot by just being in the various meetings. It was great getting a chance to meet some of the people Cecilia ministers to.

I can't believe my time in Salta has concluded! God has really blessed my time here and I have a lot to think about and to reflect on now that I'm back in Belfast.

FUSION Volunteer Cristian Ascui has concluded his placement and the following are some of his reflections.

As I evaluate my experience of being part of the SAMS FUSION initiative, it's hard to summarize all the things that have been going on for the last 10 months in only a few paragraphs, but I will do my best.

In the very beginning everything was a "wee" bit different. There were a lot of words that I hadn't heard or used before. For example: "dead on", "I hope you're not too bad", "so there you are lad", "all the best" and "that was good craic".

The people here have treated me as one of the family. The warmth, kindness and love have made me feel pretty much as in Chile. My involvement in the church has been extensive, working along with the Rector, Rev Canon Porteus and Rev Hagan by visiting a lot of parishioners, helping in Sunday school and taking part in all of the three services on Sundays. During the week I have been involved with different activities and meetings and of course working, playing, teaching, learning and sharing with the Derryloran Cubs.

I can say that my **FUSION** experience has been awesome; it has been a time full of blessings. I have learnt new things, got to know new people and all this has helped me to grow in a spiritual and personal way. Even though not everything was always good (sprained ankle, death of my best friend in Chile and the earthquake in Chile) I felt the love of God through the people of Cookstown. I would like to say thank you very much to everyone for this areat time.

n September, Stephen Trew and I ran the Dublin Half Marathon. (It is so easy compared to a full one). The Bible talks a lot about running the race, and running a long distance race has a lot to teach us about the Christian life – training, endurance, focus, and the importance of encouragement and support and cheering each other on. There is also a sense of "We are all in this together" even with people you don't know.

That "We are all in this together" on our Christian walk is important as through the marathon I raised almost £600.00 for SAMS and specifically for the work of the church in Concepcion. The team there work with hundreds of children and young people every week, as well as adults, in five areas of the town, and travel large distances to country areas. Faithfully they are teaching them God's Word, shining his light and showing his love in practical ways. The work costs money even for such

things as transport to the different areas, and they appreciate us joining in this with them, encouraging and supporting and cheering them along. We run the race and keep the faith together with those in other parts of the world. Thank you to all those who supported this.

Another way of supporting and spurring each other on, of running the race together, is through prayer. Prayer is such an important part of mission, as it is of the Christian life, and it is a powerful weapon. In SAMS Ireland you can receive a bi-monthly prayer request booklet called "Prayer lines." This can be received by post or downloaded from the SAMS website. We are also sending out an update with prayer requests about every fortnight. This is challenging if you don't have a real fire so, find one and then switch off all the so-called advancements of modern technology and take a few moments to just stare at the fire and be still.

Constantly we are influenced by advertisers and the media to seek 'more,' yet deep down we know that the 'more' they try to sell us doesn't actually meet our deeper needs. At this point, if we are courageous, we have a moment of opportunity to ask searching questions. Unconsciously we can buy into a system which has been hyped up by a fastmoving, instant-reward culture, so that we are addicted to a need for excitement.

Without 'winter fire' moments our lives can take on a recurring pattern alternating between boom and

bust. The bubble bursts and we seek the next hit as we deny our inner turmoil. Through rest the human soul is refreshed, creativity re-emerges, relationships are strengthened and, most of all, we find space to reflect on how we are living and on our relationship with our Creator and our neighbour!

We need to stop and find rest. Only that way will we find the inspiration, creative energy and vision to engage authentically with God's world.
