

Link Letter No.6 Christmas 2013

Dear friends,

“And anyone who welcomes a little child like this on my behalf is welcoming me.” Matthew 18:5

Our life in Paraguay is often characterised by phases, and a current phase we are looking at involves “welcome”, particularly the welcome given to children who are often amongst the most vulnerable members of society. Jesus’ disciples failed on many occasions but Jesus appears to be patient although firm with them in their crises and moments of failure. However, it is notable that when they failed to receive children with love and respect, Jesus was angry with them.

As mission partners we meet people from many different religious groupings and Sally was recently invited to visit a religious community called the Bruderhof who kindly gave us a copy of *Why Children Matter*. Author Johann Arnold, a member of this group, wisely writes: *“If we have children we must welcome them as they are.”* Peter has been visiting the city congregations teaching on “welcome” and, as part of this teaching, we are looking specifically at what each church is doing for children within their community. This process has so far involved interviewing each pastor and asking open ended questions that give space to think about vision

They then spent three years at Parr St Peter’s in the Diocese of Liverpool. Peter became the Anglican bishop of Paraguay at the invitation of the diocese’s leaders and was consecrated on 29 March 2009.

The Anglican Church in Paraguay has historically been involved in several ministries that involve children and we thought that in this link letter we would share a little of this.

FEISA

We are both involved on the recently formed board of FEISA and excited to see the development of new courses to train more widely those who work in early years’ teaching. Sally has been involved in the FEISA toy library as a volunteer, along with FEISA director Ana Maria. We are having a rethink of the toy library

ministry, taking the decision to run regular sessions in fewer locations and particularly running sessions for Anglican children's clubs. The toy library sessions will also be used to train children's workers alongside other training courses that are going on for those who feel called to work with children in evangelism and children's groups.

Esperanza foster home

Sally is now the president of this small foster home which caters for one-five year olds from troubled situations. It's a small family home setting, looking after the children as they await the outcome of legal procedures – either to return them to birth families or place them with adoptive families. The Esperanza photo of the little feet cannot show the children's faces for legal reasons in order to protect their identities as they are wards of court of the Paraguayan State. Esperanza (meaning Hope) is now a non-profit organisation which has its own legal status. It is the judicial system, via the adoption agency and other government agencies, that places children in Esperanza for their protection and well being whilst their living situations are legally resolved.

Basically we are four ladies: Sally, Teresa Maidana (the wife of one of our pastors) and Ana Maria and Mary Liz, two sisters who are mothers from St Andrew's School. We really enjoy working together but the challenges are great, especially fundraising and the staffing of the home. The reward of being part of the story of a child's life, being able to pray, watching blessings flow, children flourish and develop and knowing that God does miracles for these precious lives, is a joy!
